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#### Ready, Set... PLAY!

With summer break just around the corner, many parents are likely wondering how to keep their children engaged, entertained, and their brains stimulated over the summer months! Out of all the recommendations that our school team has provided to families over the last few years, this one is the most shared: make time for playdates.

Over the course of the pandemic, our children's freedom to play with others has been highly compromised, and at the school level, we have been noticing the effects. In general, our students have shown a greater need for more direct teaching and practice of social-emotional skills, and our teachers have done an exceptional job meeting them where they're at. More opportunities for outdoor unstructured play, connections over interests, and open-ended collaborative activities have been woven into the students' days. The more the children feel a sense of connection and belonging, the more they are able to learn new things and think critically.

So, what can you do to support your children over the summer? **Make time for playdates!** Connecting with school friends over the summer helps to maintain relationships, but further, it gives them the chance to practise their ROCKS (Respect, Open-mindedness, Communication, Kindness, and Success).

To prepare for successful social interactions, it helps to use the ROCKS language in your daily interactions. For example, if your child shows flexibility with something that they're typically rigid about, you could say, "Thanks for being open-minded about this. I know this can be hard for you." Eventually, your child may eventually transfer this flexibility to their social interactions, where they will hopefully recognize the positive effects.

Specifically having one of the ROCKS as a focus for a playdate can be a way to have your child practice a skill that they've been working on at home. Prompting this can sound like: "I have noticed you've been working hard on being flexible and open-minded at home. I wonder how that might look like at your playdate this afternoon." Your child may come up with some ideas such as sharing a toy or being open to their friend's ideas. After the playdate, following up about how things went can help to bring it full circle. If you were supervising the playdate, you could do this by acknowledging how your child showed flexibility (ie. "I noticed you were being flexible by letting your friend choose a game first. Way to go!". If you were not there, you could ask your child if they noticed themselves being open-minded (ie. "Did you notice yourself being open-minded today? What did that look like?"). Focusing on what went well can help your child recognize their capacity for growth, even in the smallest increments!

Developing social-emotional skills takes time, practice, and in-person interactions with similar-aged peers. So, what's your child's homework for the summer? **GO OUT AND PLAY!**


